RABBI'S FORUM

Rabbi Anthony Fratello

The year that Rabbi Tract and I were living and studying in Israel, we ended up having a two week break around Passover. Wanting to take advantage of our time and experience, we booked a tour that took place (in part over the Passover Holiday). Believe me, we were VERY torn about this. It was hard to give up on Celebrating IN Jerusalem, but we consoled ourselves on the fact that it was an Israeli tour. Rabbi Tract and I (and the other Rabbinical Students that we were traveling with) were the ONLY Americans on the trip. Moreover, they would be organizing and hosting a Seder on the First Night. So... it was with great fanfare and hope that we set off.

Our experience was somewhat underwhelming, I am sad to say. The Seder took up all of 8 minutes. Immediately after all the Matzah was served, they brought out a regular meal replete with bread, rice, and any number of other things that were not Pesadikh. We kept to our own practice and said, "Well... next time we will know."

It seemed so very odd to us that our fellow travelers would go to all the work of arranging a Seder on their trip, but then doing little to nothing to actually keep the holiday. Point of fact, the Matzah ran out after a day or two. But, this experience taught us a very important lesson:

Passover, like many of the Jewish Holidays, is deeply ingrained in our hearts and souls. Whoever we are, wherever we are, we naturally gravitate to it. (Similarly, many Israelis do not go to synagogues on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, but the country itself closes down. Many Israelis do not attend synagogues on Shabbat, but every Friday they will greet you with, "Shabbat Shalom!") These customs, these rhythms, they are simply a part of who we are. How wonderful that is! How amazing that is! After all of these years; even after all of the change that has been wrought in our community, we feel the pull of the old ways.

I am so excited that this year we are again having our Second Night Seder at TSS. COVID 2020 we Zoomed from Temple; you all could sit and watch as my family and I ate. COVID 2021 and 2022, we Zoomed from our Home; sorry it was not cleaner!

This year we will be back in our familiar place with our familiar people, celebrating once again.

I know many of you will join us. I know most of you will have a Seder on April 5, some will have another the next night. I know some of you may only have a small piece of Matzah and then give the Holiday little more thought. Do I wish you were a little more particular in observing the Holiday? Sure. However, what I ultimately want is for EACH of you to feel your own way through the Holiday. Want I want for EACH of you is to make the Holiday special in whatever way speaks to you. Passover is about Family. Passover is about celebrating the Miracle of our People's Deliverance from servitude to Pharaoh. Feel that, and the rest will fall into place.

Have a crumby holiday!

From the Board Room February 2023

It is strange for me to realize that while the secular new year (which begins January 1) is just beginning we are more than half way through the Temple Shaarei Shalom year (which begins July 1). It has been a busy TSS half-year.

Cantor Carrie Barry will be joining TSS in July (pending Congregation approval). She was raised in Coral Springs, and has served congregations in Palm Beach and Broward Counties and is presently Cantor at Congregation Ahavath Chesed in Jacksonville.

At Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, she received the Rabbi Jill Kreitman Prize in Homiletics, the Kreitman Prize in History, the Cantor George Weinflash Sh'liach Tzibbur Award, the Cantorial Alumni Prize, and the Cantor Norman Summers Award for Excellence in Studies. She was ordained in 2005. She is married and has two sons.

Alpert Jewish Family Services (JFS) has signed a multi-year contract with TSS to rent a portion of our Tendrich Center space. Many thanks to Caryn Feldman whose vision and perseverance enabled this to become a reality. JFS will use the space primarily for meetings. In addition, they will be expanding the Food Pantry that has been at TSS for several years. This will better able them to ease the burden of those who need this help. Holly Bromer, a TSS Board Member and a coordinator of the Food Insecurity Committee at JFS will help to effectuate a strong outreach to those in need.

There will be separate entrances and opportunities for TSS members to attend JFS programming. Their activities will not interfere with TSS services, programs, or activities.

The Board approved a new policy for building closure. The entire TSS building will be closed for Jewish holidays (as before) and for Federal holidays.

Our Affinity Groups are doing well (see page 9) It is gratifying to see our members meeting in different venues as they pursue their individual interests. If there is no existing group that meets your needs/wishes, please contact Vice President John Sudenfield who can help you reach out to others and start a new group.

Looking forward, April brings "showers" and Passover. Over 120 people will be joining us for our annual 2nd night Seder. May brings our Annual Meeting (Tues, May 16 at 7pm). There is an unusually large number of Board positions to be filled. The Nominating Committee is interviewing and the slate will be mailed to you by end of April. Please be sure to submit your ballot for Cantor approval and Board Vote. Your vote is important.

May you and your loved ones be blessed with a Chag Pesach Sameach ... a Happy Passover.

Social Outreach, Action and Reform Committee (S.O.A.R.)

This April, Jews worldwide will celebrate Passover. We will gather with family and friends to read from a book called the *haggadah*, meaning "telling," which contains the order of prayers, rituals, readings, and songs for the Passover *seder*. The word seder means "order." The ancient rabbis composed a list of steps that we follow to this day to tell the story of our ancestors' Exodus from Egypt. The story, rituals and customs of the seder link us to previous generations and to the generations to come. The Passover holiday is a celebration of freedom and family; however, we would be remiss if we did not recognize that while the Jewish people may be free, not everyone has cause for celebration. Many people, even in a free society such as ours, are bound by hardships and challenges that make them virtual slaves to their circumstances.

Passover is a holiday rich in social justice themes. It is impossible to re-tell the Jewish story of redemption and not feel compelled to eradicate injustice in the world today. Among the primary social justice themes found in the Exodus story and in the Passover observance are hunger, homelessness, oppression, and redemption. Below, please find ways to incorporate social action themes into your Passover observance:

Donate Your Chametz.

The pre-Passover ritual of cleaning our homes of *chametz*, or leavening, requires the thorough cleaning of the entire house in a search for leavened products, down to the smallest crumb. The process reminds us of those who search daily for a nutritional meal to sustain themselves and their families. This Passover, donate your *chametz* to food pantries or soup kitchens. Temple Shaarei Shalom will be holding a Passover food drive and will be accepting donations in the front lobby through April 9. In addition, consider making contributions to (or volunteering at) The Soup Kitchen of Boynton Beach and/or the Community Caring Center's food pantry. These organizations are right in our backyard, where 1 in 6 people don't know where their next meal is coming from.

Invite a stranger into your home.

Passover serves as a painful reminder that the Jewish people were strangers in the land of Egypt and spent 40 long years of wandering in the wilderness without a home. Throughout the Torah, we are reminded of this fact; for example, in Exodus 23:9, we read, "You shall not oppress a stranger, since you yourselves know the feelings of a stranger, for you also were strangers in the land of Egypt." In Leviticus 19:33 we find, "When a stranger resides with you in your land, you shall not do him wrong." The list goes on and on. Passover serves as a reminder that it is we who make people strange to us and estranged from us. And it is we who have the power to make strangers friends. As such, invite strangers to your home...or maybe just an elderly neighbor or divorced friend. No one should be alone and made to feel as a stranger during the holiday.

Supplement your Seder with poetry or alternative readings questioning modern-day slavery.

Human trafficking is the illegal trade of people for exploitation or commercial gain. Over twenty million people, including five million children, are victims of human trafficking each year. In fact, Florida ranks #3 out of all states in the Country for incidents of Human Trafficking; and Palm Beach County ranks #3 out of all counties in the State for suspected cases of Human Trafficking. This Passover, consider supplementing your seder with readings to remember that slavery didn't end in Egypt as many people around the world are victims of modern day slavery and human trafficking. The Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (RAC) offers many readings to choose from, including a special haggadah with a unique perspective on modern-day slavery. Furthermore, many Jews update the seder by supplementing the recitation of the biblical plagues with the mention of contemporary "plagues" like human-trafficking. As you remove a drop of wine from your cup for each plague, be reminded you can't drink a "full cup" of joy when other people suffer.

Update Your Seder Plate.

The objects on the seder plate help us remember the Passover story. Alongside the traditional items on the seder plate, consider some of modern additions like an orange or fair-trade chocolate. The addition of an orange to the seder plate is a way of acknowledging the role of people who feel marginalized within the Jewish community, for instance, LGBTQ Jews. The fair trade movement promotes economic partnerships based on equality, justice and sustainable environmental practices. By including fair-trade chocolate or cocoa beans on the seder plate, we are reminded that although we escaped from slavery in Egypt, forced labor is still very much an issue today. I've read about many other items used to infuse social justice themes into the holiday meal. What other symbols would you add and why?
